Local History Group Visit July 14th

Did you know that you could see in Colchester evidence of a Roman Theatre which held 3,500 people?

Did you know that Colchester has the only surviving Roman arch in this country which is still in daily use? (Approaching the Mercury Theatre)

These were just two of the fascinating facts the group learnt on their walk around Colchester with our Blue Badge Guide.

The walk took about an hour and a half starting from the Castle gates and it was totally engrossing. Our guide took us through the history from the time of the Roman emperor Claudius, up to the present day stopping off to look at a wide variety of buildings from every age.

Maritime

Trip on the *MV Pocahontas* to watch the Blackwater Barge Match
Forty-two seasoned young salts from the Maritime Group crossed over from the Blackwater Estuary to the Thames on Saturday July 12. We boarded *MV Pocahontas* at Gravesend and followed the barges in the 78th Annual Sailing Match from the starting line all the way downstream to the North Oaze Buoy off Shoeburyness and back. On both legs, we motored close alongside one barge after another, and there was a knowledgeable commentary telling its history as well as pointing out landmarks on both shores such as the remains of the Mulberry Harbour off Southend. Most of the competing barges were familiar to us from The Hythe – in full sail, they were a superb sight and gave so many great photo opportunities throughout the day. These barge matches have been taking place off and on ever since 1863 when they were started by Henry Dodd. The DJs at the pirate radio station on Red Sands Fort waved to us as we passed. And we admired the alacrity with which each barge crew raised and lowered the leeboards every time they ‘went about’ while tacking on the return leg. We even learned to call the back-end of a barge the transom, not the stern. In the end, because of the strong westerly, it was going to take too long for the barges to tack all way back up to Gravesend. So the match was abandoned at that stage, with *Marjorie* being declared the overall winner.

We’d waved our binoculars, cameras and packed lunches throughout the voyage and at the end thanked Malcolm Case for arranging a wonderful day out. He even made sure it never rained while we were afloat.

### **Maritime Group's Liverpool Trip**

Forty eight members of the Maldon U3A left Maldon on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> July and headed to Wrexham. On the way we stopped at the Wedgwood factory and had a very reasonable priced lunch in the Wedgwood Visitors Centre. Then we visited the Wedgwood Centre shop where we saw some of the beautiful pieces produced at the factory at not so reasonable prices. We then visited Bridgemere Garden World which must be one of the biggest garden centres I have ever visited. Then we made our way to the first of our two hotels, the Ramada Plaza Hotel Wrexham. After a very nice evening meal some of us retired to the bar for a few jar's before wending our way to our rooms.

Sunday morning we left Wrexham for Liverpool for a guided tour of Liverpool (European Capital of Culture). Then we headed to a parking spot between the Albert and Wellington docks where we were able at leisure to visit the tall ships moored in these docks. During the few weeks prior to this trip I had seen some adverse reports on Liverpool and its inhabitants. I was delighted to say that on all the occasions we visited Liverpool and surrounding districts the place was very clean and tidy and the people were very friendly. After seeing all of the tall ships in the Wellington dock and going on board the Mexican Naval Ship "Cuauhtemoc" Eileen and I headed for the Albert dock, passed the famous Liver building but this proved to be a tall ship too far so we headed up into the city centre where a very nice policeman told us where we could get a cup of tea. Then it was back to the coach via a Sunday Market in a disused tea warehouse. Although it had fallen to disrepair it was a nice piece of Victorian architecture and I was pleased to note that it was soon to be turned into apartments. Chester was our last stop of the day, where we made our way to the second of our hotels The Best Westminster Hotel. The hotel was somewhat smaller than the Ramada. The rooms were cosy to say the least and the food on the whole was good.

On Monday morning we made our way to Liverpool's Pier head to embark on Mersey Ferries (River Explorer) for a short trip up the River Mersey. While we were on the River, Phil our driver looked out the best place for us to view the Tall Ships leaving Liverpool. So we drove the short distance up the coast to New Brighton where we had an excellent view of these lovely vessels, unfortunately the wind was against them so they were not in full sail. Nevertheless the flotilla led by H.M.S. Argyll was a spectacular sight.

## River Blackwater U3A Study Group

### Talk from Nigel Harmer, Maldon River Bailiff

When asked by the group what his job entailed Nigel ruefully replied “ If a job involves getting wet or muddy, call out the River Bailiff!” While this is probably true, of course there is a lot more to such a responsible, well-established job. There are records of a river bailiff since 1155 for the Maldon district. Nearby Colchester doesn't have a bailiff and so on occasions Nigel will be asked to do certain jobs for them – on a paying basis.

The bailiff is responsible for issuing mooring licenses and checking out the traffic on the river with regard to legality, safety and speed limits. These areas are continual sources of problems. Many boat owners are either moored in unregistered locations or have simply obtained a mooring without paying their dues. The area around Mill Beach is a particular trouble spot. However Nigel is in hot pursuit and the offending owners are noted, given warning and if this is ignored then their may be confiscated and eventually sold at auction. Compared with some other rivers in England the mooring charges are very reasonable. Another cause of concern is jet skiers. Whilst certain areas of the river are permissible for jet skiing, and speed limits imposed, again these are frequently ignored. Unfortunately this can lead to some very dangerous traffic when mixed with other users in small boats – particularly children. Also it is very surprising how some children are allowed to jet ski alone in unsuitable conditions. We heard how one foggy, Sunday morning when Nigel was out patrolling quite early in the day, he caught up with two children of 7 and 11, unaccompanied, heading for the beach. In fact they were nearly at the mouth of the Blackwater by then and had no idea where they were. When returned to their parents it was not appreciated by any one concerned.

Jet skiers are regularly prosecuted for infringement of the speed rules and Nigel has now built up a picture of the average Jet Ski owner; he reckons the novelty wears off after about 11 months and then the Jet Ski is put up for sale. But the problem continues since there's always a new owner on the river.

The biggest problem the Blackwater has is siltation. It is happening all along the rivers of East Anglia and is a very difficult situation to deal with since dredging only has a temporary effect. In just a few weeks the silt builds up again and the problem seems to get worse. The consequence of this is a serious one since the river could become un-navigable into Maldon. This would change the town in a radical way. There are examples of towns like Rye and Winchelsea, which used to be ports but which over time, have become land bound. The reason for increased rate of siltation is not known – could it be connected to climate change affecting tides and movement of water?

Our river bailiff is often called out on matters outside his remit – say rescuing a trapped swan – and this type of thing adds to his daily burden. He used to have an assistant but sadly not now, and because of the nature of current business practice spends more time than he would like office bound responding to emails etc. Also the restrictions imposed by his budget means he has to plan very carefully time on the water since his fuel allowance is finite, and in these difficult times of accelerating costs means rationing time on the river. We spent a very interesting morning with Nigel, who was full of knowledge and anecdotes about his unique job. We were left with impression of a man who knows the Blackwater thoroughly, loves his job and will continue doing it as well as he can.

It is now a home to many water birds, basically the canal is now clean enough to support wild life. We saw Kingfishers, Swans, Herons and Cormorants to name but a few. The canal, which was built to carry ships right to the heart of Manchester, is as deep as the Suez Canal was when it was built. This guaranteed that if a ship could sail through the Suez Canal it could sail up the Manchester Ship Canal. There were six swing bridges, one swing aqueduct plus four locks to negotiate. The approach to Salford Quays was truly magnificent we saw the Lowry Centre, Old Trafford, Home of Manchester United and the new BBC Centre under construction. This is where we ended our journey and boarded our coach for the journey back to Chester. Everybody I spoke to enjoyed the trip very much.

Well all-good things have to come to an end and Thursday saw us on our way home. We called at Wightwick Manor on the way back. This is a lovely manor house built at the end of the Victorian era by the Mander Family who had close ties with Wolverhampton having owned a paint and varnish factory in the city. After lunch at the Mermaid Pub we headed off on the last leg of our journey back to Maldon.

This is but a brief synopsis of what was for Eileen and I, a fun and interest filled six days.

In conclusion I would like to thank Malcolm and Rosemary for what I consider was a very nice and very well organised trip.
