LONDON WALKS

London Walks take place on the 3rd Tuesday of the month.

We meet a professional guide at 11.00 to be taken on a 2-hour guided walk. The distance walked is not vast as we stop many times to be told interesting and entertaining information. After the walk you are free to join others for coffee/lunch or plan other things to make the most of your day in London. Travel arrangements are made by yourselves.

Another interesting walk was enjoyed before Christmas by a large group of us. The theme was finding out about the history of Christmas food.

Turkeys were brought to England by William Strickland around 1540. William, a Yorkshire man, had a coat of arms designed incorporating a turkey, and in Boyton, East Yorkshire, the church has stained glass windows of turkeys, and the lectern has a carved turkey, with its outspread tail feathers supporting the Bible. Norfolk and Suffolk became established for raising young turkeys with the birds being walked to London with tar and sand on their feet to protect them for the long journey. By the end of the 19th century, it was decided it would be easier to slaughter the birds on the farms and transport the dead birds to London by horse and carriage.

Until the 20th century, turkey was a luxury, with goose being a more affordable bird. We stood in Leadenhall Market outside the old Golden Goose pub, learning facts about the variety of uses of geese and goose products, including their talent for acting as security guards. Would you believe there is even a colour in the textile and wool trade known as Goose Turd Green! Old Tom was a goose adopted by the stall holders of the market, who, after dying at the age of 37, lay in state and had an obituary printed in The Times.



Pigs in blankets were a surprisingly modern innovation dating only from 1957. Our guide regaled us with the details of the extravagant fare provided for the Christmas table through the ages, in contrast to the meagre meals in the work houses, and the fat and horsemeat Christmas dinner eaten by Captain Scott in the Antarctic.



We talked about bread sauce whilst standing outside Bakers Hall, the site of the Worshipful Company of Bakers since 1506, and ate mince pies provided by our guide. We discussed the lavish ingredients of plum pudding whilst standing in Pudding Lane and the oldest of all Christmas ingredients, marzipan,

introduced by crusaders in the 11th century.

And of course, ending in Borough Market after crossing the river Thames, we

couldn't forget the humble Brussel sprout!

His talk covered his memories of growing up on the banks of the river Thames in Vauxhall, Central London, and of the people that he met later as a City of London Guide. Ian took us on a trip downstream from Putney to Greenwich recollecting the riverfront changes with stories and information from people that he had met. He highlighted the old and new buildings, monuments, and industries on the riverfront and the ceremonies and festivals that have taken place along this stretch of the river Thames. The talk finished at Waterloo Bridge, which is also known as Ladies Bridge as the rebuilding of the bridge was completed by women as most of the men had gone off to war. Ian then played his signature tune *Waterloo Sunset* by the Kinks.

AVIATION PROGRAMME 2025

Friday 28th February

We will have an illustrated talk by Dave "Flash" Davies, who is a local professional photographer, for many years the company photographer at Marconi in Chelmsford and more recently the official photographer at Stow Maries Great War Aerodrome.

His subject matter will be Photography ABC with an emphasis on the infancy of photography from the air and its evolution from WWI to more recent times.

Friday 28th March

This meeting is devoted to a considered evaluation of the air disasters that befell the Boeing 737 Max. This will start with a short, illustrated talk by Chris Samson about the phenomena of the "Super Stall" which led to electronically signalled stall recovery systems for civil airliners followed by an illustrated presentation from a non-aviation specialist who brings a refreshingly new approach to analysing what went wrong in causing not

one but two catastrophic failures of the latest aspiration of arguably one of the most successful passenger carrying aircraft ever produced.

Friday 25th April

We will show a **film** of the flight by 3 members of the AUSTER Club who took their aircraft to Normandy to celebrate the 80th anniversary of D-day last June and to commemorate the contribution made by the AUSTER AOP (Artillery Observation Post) to the success of the landings.

Thursday 22nd May

We will visit the **RAF Museum**, **Hendon**, combining with the Garden Group who we will drop off at Capel Manor Gardens, Enfield on the way to Hendon.

We will travel by coach with the first pickup at the Fords yard in Althorne, then West Maldon Community Centre and finally at Eves Corner, Danbury (this may change if the parking charges at Eves Corner make this impractical).

Entry to the museum is free; coach cost is £30 pp, bookings will be accepted from January 2025 with cheque please made out to Maldon & District u3a.

Thursday 26th June

We will visit the **Spitfire Factory** at **Biggin Hill airport** for a guided tour of the facility where 12 or more Spitfires are undergoing complete rebuilds to full flying status. We are combining with the Garden Group who will then proceed to Hever Castle, Edenbridge, (about 20 mins from Biggin). The plan is for the coach to return to Biggin to collect members after the Factory tours, to then visit the Air Museum, then return to Hever to collect our Gardens colleagues before heading for home.

As usual we will travel by coach, with the first pickup at the Fords yard in Althorne, then West Maldon Community Centre and finally at Eves Corner ,Danbury (this may change if the proposed parking charges at Eves Corner make this impractical). The cost of the Guided Tour is £49 pp, and the coach cost is approximately £31 pp; bookings will be accepted from January with cheque please made out to Maldon & District u3a .



ASTRONOMY

The next meeting of the group is on **Monday 27th January**, starting at 7:30pm at the Chigboro Fishing Club, Chigborough Road, Heybridge, Maldon for an evening of observing the night sky, all u3a members are very welcome to join us. Telescopes and binoculars will be available, but please bring yours if available. Please remember that whilst viewing the night sky you can get very cold; to help, we always have tea/coffee and biscuits available at a very small charge.

Jupiter will be visible from the end of January through to the end of February. Venus is a bright pre-dawn object throughout the month of February, low down in the South East.



The constellation of Orion 'The Hunter' is due South at 7pm in late February, followed by the 'Dogs' of Canis Major and Minor. Canis Major (Greater Dog) contains the brightest star in the sky, Sirius, and is located to the lower left of Orion. This constellation does look a bit like a dog, but Canis Minor (Lesser

Dog) to the left of Orion is simply made up of the bright star Procyon and a scattering of faint stars – and so is one of the least sensible of the ancient constellations in terms of what it is supposed to represent.

The bright stars of Sirius and Procyon along with Betelgeuse in Orion make up the 'Winter Triangle'. Both Procyon and Sirius are binaries, with their companions being white dwarf stars – tiny, hot and dense remnants of stars that have run out of hydrogen fuel. A small piece of a white dwarf star the size of a sugar cube would weigh several tonnes.



This is a good time of year to see 'Earthshine' on the dark portion of the Moon. This is the faint illumination of the lunar surface from the light reflected from Earth. In our sky the Moon is of course a bright object, but as seen from the Moon, the Earth appears in the sky much brighter. New moon is on 9th February, and daylight expands more rapidly through February as the sun climbs higher each day. By the end of the month sunset is at 5.45pm and twilight lasts until after 7.30pm so the stars are best seen after that time. By late evening the constellations we in the northern hemisphere associate with Spring are visible in the East, including the constellations of Leo, Virgo and Boötes. Arcturus is both the brightest star in Boötes and the brightest star in the northern half of the sky. It can be seen this month about a third the way up the sky from the horizon at midnight, looking due East. Arcturus is noticeably orange in colour and is about 37 light years from our solar system.
